GENEROUS PEOPLE... DIVINE PROVIDENCE!

After two years of drought, people were starving. Not only so but now they faced a new growing season without seed to give hope for a change. Besides this, the rumble of civil war had begun again with roads blocked off, travel very difficult and often only by military convoy. It was certainly a very disconcerting time for everyone!

As we shared the need with you all this past year, many gave very generously, both in Canada and Switzerland! Early last year we distributed just over 28 tons of food to some of the worst affected areas but now the situation was even worse and a new season was on us.

As we prayed and planned together with our leaders, it was agreed that we would buy food, but we would also buy seed since this would help break the cycle if we had rain. Although there were no guarantees, we trusted that God had spoken through the leadership. The obstacles were many; sourcing the food and seed, and even more challenging, finding a way to distribute it with the military convoys and violence.

As we prayed and searched, we found an abundant supply of good seed at a great price. We came up with a plan to use

the train to distribute to key points from where our leaders could distribute locally. We were able to distribute more than 14 tons of seed and over 10 tons of food to very hungry people. The rains came the following week, so we anticipate a great harvest! Thank you! ■

In the midst of the busyness, I was asked to please assess one of our sponsored students. He was a 14-year-old boy who had been having health struggles for several months. He had been to hospital and had received "treatment" without success. Josh and Chelsea McManus arrived here from Morinville, Alberta in October and they brought a generous donation from their home church, The Father's House. As we contemplated what the funds would go towards, we received Toni's diagnosis of Hodgkins lymphoma. The best treatment he could receive would be in Zimbabwe, our neighboring country, but there would be additional

costs that regular sponsorship certainly doesn't cover. God is not surprised by anything though, and the timing of his diagnosis and the arrival of this offering were proof of His provision even before we knew what would unfold. As I write

this, Toni is undergoing his 3rd round of chemo and other generous donors have contributed to see this through. Toni is a sweet and brave boy who loves the Lord. Your prayers for him and his family at this time are appreciated! ■

The larger kitchen and dining area will be able to accommodate the growing number of people who are served every day. Thanks to the generosity our supporting churches, the kitchen has also been furnished with some new, bigger, and better equipment.

Our air fares have been purchased and plans are to leave for Brazil on Feb. 20th, 2017. Three colleagues will

be accompanying us; Anita Pearce, a friend and FCA evangelist from Margo SK., Janette Stone, SAM Ministries Child Sponsorship Coordinator, and Shannon Weiss, our new SAM Ministries

missionary for Mozambique. Shannon will be spending three months in Brazil learning Portuguese and sharing ministry with our Mount Horeb team. ■
